His stories are well-paced, and he delivers them with surprise and humor and suspense. Well, Bob Goff is the guy on steroids. If you're reading Donald Miller's fantastic memoir, a million miles in a thousand years, and if you don't, you should-you probably remember Bob. He's the guy who throws a neighborhood parade every year to celebrate the gift today. According to Don, Bob lives better stories than anyone I know. After years of pleading and pleading with his friends to collect more of these tales, Bob finally sat down and did it. Love Does: Discover secretly incredible life in the ordinary world (Thomas Nelson, paperback, 224 pages) is a collection of stories that show the biggest lesson Bob has learned, namely that love is not emotion or state of mind: it's action. He must have lived and experienced and Bob demonstrates that in an almost incredible way. Like the night he made his way to the Library of Congress for a love of adventure. Or this week, he parked on a bench right outside the dean's office, until law school finally let him in. Then there was the time when he spent sixteen days in the Pacific with five guys and a box of meat. And lest we forget, his epic escape from a burning jeep right before it exploded. I think my favorite story came when Bob encouraged his children to write letters to the leaders of every country in the CIA database. The letters, simple and innocent, ended with an invitation to hang out. And it's amazing that it worked: We sent letters in the mail. Many of them. Hundreds and hundreds of them. We waited a week or two and then every day after school we would check the children's mailbox for any mail. It wasn't long before the answers started coming. It was slow at first, maybe one or two a day. But then dozens started streaming every day from all over the world. A day or two later an envelope arrived with the Prime Minister of Switzerland, inviting the children to Bern. Then came a letter from the President of Israel inviting him to come to Jerusalem. Over the following weeks, they didn't just get one yes - they got twenty-nine. Maria and I didn't know what to do, so we did everything we could. We started a family training program to decorate our manners. One of the yesses came from a real living prince, so we taught our children how to bow and curtsy, too. What will happen most often is that the children will start in the official reception room and we will have an official meeting with the head. But then the leaders will realize that they were just kids who had no other agenda but to be friends, and they would invite us back to their cabinets where they could just talk to talk Friends. Children asked questions about the leader's families, how they got into the civil service and what their hopes for the future are. The leaders talked about their children and grandchildren, what they were doing when they were our children's age, and their dreams of friendship between people from our countries. Love Does is filled with some wonderful stories like this, but a couple of things did rankle me. First, each story is accompanied by a spiritual understanding that seemed a little banal. The book might have been better if the reflections were left to the reader if every good story was allowed to stand on its own to allow the reader to make spiritual connections. Also, there is a persistent Jesus good, a religion badly underwater throughout the book: Jesus was not a religious guy. To me Jesus sounded like an ordinary guy who was absolutely awesome. I never wanted religion. I don't understand, and don't particularly want to either. Honestly, I thought religion was for wimpy guys who didn't get into evil. I would rather exchange all religious jargon for the opportunity to invite people to experience Jesus. Now, I understand Bob's religion criticism is not a religion I know. According to Bob, religion means empty practices, spurred by righteous cliques and bitter gatekeepers. But it's not true religion. True religion is alive and alive and rich. History shows that holy people found Jesus through religion, not around it. I think of someone as a bl. Pierre Giorgio Frassati, a prankster and adventurer in his own right, whom Bob would have loved. Pierre-George found Jesus through religion through the Eucharist and the Church. So for the saints, religion is the way to God, not a barrier. But despite these doubts, Love Does it Just Be Fun to Read. The book is light and capricious and filled with adventures. Bob Goff is one of those rare people who doesn't just tell good stories; he lives by them. And Love inspires you to follow his example.
